Don Bennett, former Int'l LLL President, will be the featured presenter at a LLL/LHM workshop.



The 89th International Lutheran Laymen Convention in Billings, Montana, came to a close on Sunday, July 9. "Glorify the Lord," Psalm 34:3 was the theme. Over 1100 attended.

One significant handout was titled "10 Great Ways You Can Share a Message of Hope in Your Community and Around the World.

Congregational Outreach

Outreach is about taking the initiative. New neighbor outreach

- a. One out of five (20%) move every year.
- b. The critical time to reach new move ins to the community is within 30 45 days.
- c. The "Rule of 7" Establish 7 close people that they know as a friend, they will probably never leave the church.
- d. Visitors to your church, follow up visits;
 - (1.) Make a 15 minute visit within 36 hours, by Monday night, 85% will come back.
 - (2.) Wait 72 hours, then 60% return
 - (3.) Wait a week only 15% return
 - (4.) If the Pastor does the visiting, the numbers are cut in half.

Your congregation has the opportunity to be a Life Saving Outpost for those whose lives do not know Jesus, always practice Hospitality. (commented Rev. Steve Siegel at the Billings, Montana convention)

Donations Support Int'l LH Ministry Centers

Currently there are forty two ministry centers around the world, go to lhm.org, hover over LHM International Ministries, click on Ministry Center facts for more information. A few examples of outreach efforts follow: Argentina - provides 20 sec. radio spots on Life Issues broadcast over 21 radio stations to a potential of 20 million listeners; China since 1990's over a million audiocassettes have been distributed to Chinese people. New is the compact disc program to reach modern audiences; Hong Kong - LHM has developed a 24 hour interactive hotline targeted at children and teens. The "Touch the Bug" hotline features nine recorded programs that include Bible stories and social guidance through spiritual based advice; Kazakhstan - LHM uses Bible Correspondence Courses, television and radio programs; Korea- Jazz and Vesper is a program that ensures the continuing growth of faith using Christian musicals and dramas.

From ministry centers, outreach through radio, television, print, and the Internet goes into many other nations.

Thirty three Kansas students studying for full-time church work will be receiving financial aid from the Project this coming school year. The \$32,000 contributed, of the \$36,000 goal, will provide \$23,000 of student financial aid, \$6,500 to be divided between the Orphan Grain Train and the Overseas Bible Correspondence Courses, \$750 for the 4th year student's recognition dinner at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, \$500 for the LHM float in the Rose Parade and \$1,250 for the Kansas District LCMS Lay Leadership Institute.

Mrs. Alejandra Dominguez, of Uruguay, at the July Lutheran Hour Ministries convention, said; "Thank You" to everyone that is packing Global Care Packages for Uruguay. Alejandra is a medical records translator by profession and volunteers at the LHM Uruguay office, established in 2001. By August 10th, 12,147 boxes have been packed. In Kansas 792 Global Care boxes have been packed.

Support these OGT Projects "Adopt an Orphanage"

Orphanage assistance in Latvia, Lithuania, Kyrgystan and Russia. may be provided for \$250.00 per month by a group, individual, family or congregation. Conditions are extremely harsh in the orphanages. OGT will purchase and deliver medicines, medical supplies, hygienic supplies, vitamins, Bibles and clothing directly to the orphanage that you adopt.

"Support to Russian Hospitals"

Designate support for three hospitals in St. Petersburg, Russia, where OGT provides medical supplies and equipment. One hospital is for the elderly, the other two are burn units for moderate to severe burn victims, many of whom are children.

"Supplies to Prisons"

Prison help, with supplies, can be provided thru OGT to a boy's prison of over 300 and a women's prison of nearly a 1,000, both in the St. Petersburg area. The OGT provides support to the only dental clinic in the Sablino Women's Prison

Orphan Grain Train Activity

From the first shipment, March 1993 to June 31, 2006, there have been 1,117 semi truck and 40 ft container loads of humanitarian aid to 27 countries and disaster response to 23 states. This years Lutheran Hour Ministries Global Care Packages will be shipped, over 1,250 of them, to Uruguay. In addition many smaller trucks and trailer loads of items have been delivered. The average overseas freight cost is \$7,000 per shipment. Over 110 semi loads have been shipped to the hurricane disaster area with the average fuel cost of \$1,350/ round trip.

OGT semi-trucks have picked up, mostly for delivery to hurricane volunteers, 56,420 bottles of water from Longford, KS. along with 28,400 food bars from Chapman, Kansas. The Kansas Division OGT sent 500 food bars and 240 bottles of water with 24 hurricane volunteers from Faith-Abilene and St. Paul - Haven Lutheran Churches. In the thank you letter from Rev. Justin Panzer of Faith-Abilene "While we give thanks to God for those who have given of their time, much more work still needs to be done. Faith and St. Paul would like to thank the Orphan Grain Train for their generous donation of water and cereal food bars for our May 29 to June 2nd trip".

Sorting and packing clothes continues at Phillipsburg and St. John's Lutheran, Herington. Shipments of over 500 boxes go out regularly from each of these locations. In the words of Ginny Riebhoff, of St. Johns Lutheran; "We continue to be very busy".
