Be A Shining Light by Pastor Mark Eichler

I don't think the Pastor meant to say it the way it came out, but he referred to a church that he had served as, "It proudly stands as a monument to the faithfulness of God." How much better if he had said, "The church stands as a living witness to the faithfulness of God."

Too often churches, and Christians, become monuments rather than living witnesses. Beginning with real zeal and enthusiasm, churches and Christians who once had a magnetic fellowship and bore an effective witness to the Christian faith, often see that energy and focus wear down. Prayers become perfunctory. Worship becomes automatic. Reaching out to those who are hurting becomes the job of the professional clergy. The Bible becomes more praised than studied. Outreach to the community becomes nil. The danger is that pride of the past can become a substitute for power in the present.

Instead, we return to the cross of Good Friday and the open tomb of Easter to find genuine love in Christ Jesus. We turn to the One whose power, through Word and Sacrament, has called us into this relationship of faith and trust. Knowing how much we are loved by God, we want others to know this Good News, too! It's simply a matter of letting the Light of God that is in us through faith shine through the good works we do. We live as shining lights allowing God to draw others to Himself through us.

The Lutheran Hour Ministries Ambassador

Recognition Dinner for 4th year students at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis (Region 9 Project)

Each year LLL members of Kansas, Missouri and Nebraska support the student and spouse dinner with a gift and speaker, this years speaker was the Rev. Ken Klaus

Kansas District Partners with Argentina in support of this overseas LHM Ministry Office. The gospel goes out to more than 20 million people, from the Argentina Ministry Office with listeners in Argentina, Chile, Paraguay and Uruguay. In addition program tapes are sent to Spain for broadcast. The office produces 30 second spots about life issues, such as marriage, divorce, friendships and violence.

Bible Correspondence Courses are used by overseas ministry offices to teach people about Jesus and the Bible in their language. "Up to 220,00 people have been involved in BCC throughout the world. The ongoing application of God's Word continues to change lives by His Holy Spirit." Lubov Koltsova is enrolled in the BCC out of the Kazakhstan Ministry office, where at the time of the report 677 people were enrolled, states "I am writing to tell you how greatly my life changed after your Bible Correspondence Courses, because I feel a great thirst in knowing God more and more".

Thrivent Funding Available

Thrivent Financial Services has three programs that make supplemental money available to not-for-profit groups; Care in Congregations, Care in Communities and Giving Plus.

Care in Congregations funds up to \$1,600/congregation annually are available, with application made for the funds through one of your three congregational representatives. These funds have a wide discretion by the congregation on how they are used, six Thrivent member families are required to participate in the event. Make application prior to the event then upon completion a report is filed and the check is sent from Thrivent.

Care in Communities is administered by the Thrivent chapter board for your area. These funds generally require a fund raising event and matching funds up to the amount raised not to exceed \$1,600. An application is filed through your Thrivent board for consideration.

Giving Plus uses a form that allows Thrivent members to apply for a 50% matching, up to \$600.00, donation that you make to LHM or any other approved, by Thrivent, not for profit organization. For more information about these funding sources, ask your Thrivent Congregational Rep., Ambassador, or go to Thrivent.Com.

Parenting Families - Me to We

A six week DVD series available that is based on concepts that address the incessant power struggles operating within families (ME) and awaken the real strengths of working together (WE). This Parenting Series my be used as an outreach tool in your community. One large congregation in Nebraska had 7 families join the church as a result of attending the sessions.

Orphan Grain Train-Activity Year 2007

Shipments sent overseas were containers the size of a semi-load. In response to domestic needs, 83 loads for a total of 154 semi truck size loads shipped from the 18 divisions. Of the 83 loads, 45 went to the Texas border mission ministries of Ysleta and Cornerstone Ranch, 17 loads to the Katrina cleanup, 7 to Native American ministries and to flooded areas in Ohio. In addition to the 154 semi size shipments, 72 trailer and vehicle loads were delivered. With the cost of shipping continuing to rise. many domestic shipments cost \$1,500 to \$2,000, overseas \$7,000 to \$10,000 per container depending on location. National Convention in Norfolk is Sept 19 and 20, 2008 beginning on Friday evening.
