#### **President's Message**

The LLL had another great year ending the fiscal year May 31. The fiscal year ended favorable to a \$19 million budget. It added over 500 new stations to the 800 previous stations broadcasting the Lutheran Hour each week. We continue to support 36 International offices and have over 1/3 of the U.S. congregations using the Men's Network to assist in reaching people in various ways to attend church. The LLL assists Synod with Ablaze, contributing to the goal to reach 100 million people by 2017 who have never before heard of Jesus.

In the Kansas District we exceeded by \$500 our \$37,000 project goal this year – the largest of all district projects. Plan to attend the State Fair booth and worship service in Hutchinson this September. Also, plan to attend our District convention at St. John's in Topeka in October. Zone 7 will host an LLL Rally on Sunday, November 7 at the Washington High School featuring Pastor Ken Klaus, Lutheran Hour Speaker, as guest speaker. Pastor Klaus will also speak at Bethany Lutheran Church in Overland Park, Kansas, in January 2011 for its 50th Anniversary celebration. All are welcome!

If you didn't attend the LLL/LWML Family Retreat this past August 6-8 at Camp Webster, Salina, plan to bring your family or grandchildren next August. Region LLL meetings will occur in the fall of 2011 in conjunction with Synod Outreach plans. ers for yourself; make yourself guideposts; consider well the highway, the road by which you went. Return, O virgin Israel, return to these your cities."

In the movies, you see them, the Pirates hoping to recover their buried loot, their booty, their treasure. They know exactly where it is, sort-a, kind-a, maybe. The map shows them the way and they do all they can to follow this secret map with the unmistakable X to mark the spot. When they reach the land of their treasure and lay their eyes

upon it then total celebration ensues.

Humans are frequently guilty of treating God's Word as a treasure map. We pull it out, only when we think it will benefit us. We tend to bury it among other "ancient treasures" where it collects dust. Such is the case reported to us in both 2 Kings and 2 Chronicles. God's written word had apparently been lost for a time until Hilkiah, who was cleaning out the temple treasury reported, "I have found the Book of the Law in the house of the LORD (2 Chronicles 34:15)."

We may remember its worth occasionally as we see the giant X that marks the spot on its cover. However, the ancient words become unfamiliar to us through disuse. "If only it were not so vague," we believe, "then I could have the treasure it intends for me." So we follow it, sort-a kind-a, maybe.

This should not be. God never intended his word to be exclusive or hidden. Instead, he intended for his word to be big and bold. God's Word is not to be a secret treasure map. Rather he designed it to be a big giant billboard, a blimp, a stadium scoreboard of the grandest scale.

Jeremiah reports that the people were to set up markers and guideposts. They were to memorize the path that they were taking. Why, you ask? Israel is about to take a little trip to Babylon and will not return any time soon. They might be tempted to write up an exclusive map and lock it away; nevertheless, God had and has big plans. Many would have to know about the return. The treasure of treasures was about to be revealed in that abandoned land.

God returned Israel to the land of promise. For the only time in history that really mattered, X would mark the spot of the real treasure. Some say, rightly so, it looks more like a cross. Here Jesus the priceless treasure would die. Some tried to lock him up and hide him away in a secret and secure way. However, Jesus would not be contained, nor known only by a few. He revealed himself to the disciples and the disciples revealed him to the world.

Our map that leads to eternal treasure is something we are fortunate to share. We no longer hide it away, but prominently display, read and hear its words. It sets up for us markers and guideposts. It gives light to our path. God's Word reminds us of another return, the return of Jesus. On that day, when Jesus makes all land the land of our treasure, total celebration will ensue.

Like a mighty wind that will cause a fire to burn even greater--be driven by God's Spirit of power, love, and self-discipline".

#### Orphan Grain Train—Relief for Human Need Worldwide

The OGT movement encourages people to share material resources in bringing Christ's name and character to needy people, both far and near.

Shipments in year 2009, of container and semi truck size were 112 units. There were also 43 domestic shipments that were less than a semi-load size. These shipments have gone to 11 different countries, with 40 shipments to Haiti to more than 200 different locations. Distribution was facilitated by OGT having set up a warehouse there after the 2008 hurricane. Kids in Haiti get many cuts followed by infections, there is a need for shoes, plastic ones that survive water (like crocks, etc.). OGT has provided support to the victims of the Tennessee and Nebraska flooding. Churches, organizations and families are sponsoring OGT shipments. "Kids Against Hunger" has a new name, "Mercy Meals" that OGT will continue to deliver to the hungry around the world.

A staff change, Richard Jostes has accepted a call to Concordia Seminary - St. Louis, effective Aug. 1st. Jana Englehart, from Norfolk, has joined the OGT staff as the new Public Relations Director. She has a 30 year background of church work experience in World Missions, Native American Missions and Parish Ministry for the LCMS.

Kansas continues to sort and pack clothes at St. John Lutheran, Hwy 4, Herington and in Phillipsburg. Two semi-loads of new clothes and hospital equipment with medical supplies have been sent to Norfolk. **Chelsey Mueller** of Assaria, KS., who did mission work in Kyrgyzstan Orphanages in the summer of 2009, is seeking support, to return to do mission work and serve as the teacher for the two children of our missionary family in Kyrgyzstan. Chelsey saw the arrival of an OGT container last summer and had a goal of raising support for a container to be delivered this summer. She collected and sorted 235 boxes of clothes, school supplies, hygiene items and medical equipment that went to Norfolk where on June 9th she helped load a container that arrived in Kyrgyzstan in early August. A second container is being packed for shipment later in Au-
