150 YEARS OF GRACE for Lutherans in Kansas

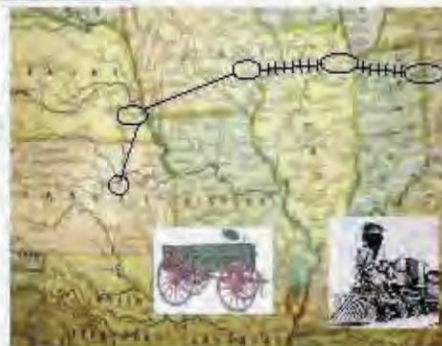


It did not just happen!

1) Lutheran and other Evangelical Christian European immigrants were met in the port of New York and recruited to the Kansas Territory so that Kansas would enter the Union a free state.

2) Pioneer Christian laymen (homesteaders, farmers) realized that "the one thing needful" (the word of God and Christian fellowship) was missing in their struggle to scratch an existence from the land that they worked.

3) In answer, a new graduate of the Lutheran seminary at Ft. Wayne, Indiana, was sent. He traveled by train via Chicago to Iowa City (see map right). Then from Iowa City, Missionary F. W. Lange in three weeks traveled with an Iowa Pastor in an open spring wagon (as pictured). He wrote, "We were under God's open sky by day and night. We bought the bread we needed from the settlers and cooked our coffee where we happened to stop". He arrived at the log cabin home of Kansas pioneer Christian F. Wetzel on Aug. 13, 1861, and conducted the first Lutheran service in the Wetzel Cabin on Aug. 17th.



4) From the Clark's creek base in the cramped loft of the cabin, in one year he organized multiple preaching and teaching stations in seven locations within horse travel range (see map right). Each preaching station was visited every 3 weeks and he also taught Bible history and catechism to young family members. By



1871, ten LCMS congregations were established (see map left).



5) St. Paul's, Clarks Creek, near Junction City was the mother congregation (photo right). Sunday morning services are regularly held at St. Paul's Church, 5804 Clark's Creek Road. Pastoral ministry is provided by Vicar Chris Schultz.



The Wetzel Cabin is on the National Registry of Historic Places since restoration by the Lutheran Laymen's League in 1955.

Orphan Grain Train News

Highlights Summer 2011 OGT Newsletter from Aug. 2nd.

Recent shipments went to; Riga Latvia, two containers to Belarus in the former Soviet Union, two containers to the Dominican Republic also eight containers are in port Haiti awaiting clearing customs. The shipments included hospital gowns-linens-sheets, lab coats, clothing, shoes, crutches, walkers,

quilts, mercy kits (hygiene items), school desks, mattresses and medical supplies.

A report of August 3rd states that OGT has shipped enough meals to feed 2.5 million hungry, in the U.S. and world.

Prior to Christmas of 2010 a 40 foot container arrived at four small villages in the former Soviet Union, 700 needy elderly and families, and 457 orphans benefited from the life preserving humanitarian aid. The container provided winter clothing, mercy kits (hygiene items), PET (hand pedaled transportation) carts, wheelchairs, medical supplies and quilts. See the newsletter for "Thank You's", with pictures, from the recipients.

Kansas provided \$2,000 towards a 3rd shipment to Kyrgyzstan of 24 sets of firefighters clothing, school desks and supplies, PET carts (hand pedaled transportation), hospital beds & equipment, quilts, and wheelchairs.

Orphan Grain Train is going to a bi-annual convention, to make each convention even bigger and better, thus no convention in 2011.

When the ladies of St. John Herington next load out a semi from Immanuel Lutheran Shady Brook, they will have packed and sent 12,921 boxes to OGT since Nov. '04.

The LWML ladies of Immanuel Junction City put 8 large boxes of hygiene kits, quilts and shoes on a semi-truck loading out hospital equipment and supplies from the Geary County Hospital to go to Orphan Grain Train in Norfolk, Nebraska.

The LWML convention had a "Gifts from the Heart" in-gathering that provided these items to OGT; 2,587 quilts, 2,382 towel sets, 2,795 sets of underwear, 5,587 hygiene kits, 13,205 Arch books and children's Bibles, 3,8875 miscellaneous items, crutches and walkers.

To ship an apple box size container of humanitarian aid averages \$10.00 per box, a 40 ft. container holds around 1,000 boxes.

Gleanings from July LHM Reports

LHM International Ministries report of July 2011 states they have determined three target areas for future direction.

1. **Unreached people.** Close to 90% of world mission work being done today is done among people who have ready access to the good news of Jesus Christ, with relatively little effort made toward the unreached thus greater effort will be placed on getting the message to the unreached. We have already taken steps to focus future ministry toward "unreached" peoples. The expansion of the Arabic language broadcasts, which will reach almost the entire Arabic speaking world, should become a reality by October of this year.
2. **Urban areas:** The majority of the world's population now lives in urban areas, and the urban areas will continue to grow in proportion to the rural population worldwide. International Ministries believes that we are uniquely poised to focus on outreach to the urban masses.
3. **Youth:** Unlike the United States, in many countries around the world there is a population bulge of younger people, yet these are the very people who are often unreached or disaffected by the church. In a place like Guatemala, for example, over 50% of the population is under 19 years old. Int'l Ministries believes that ministry targeted toward ages 15-25 should be expanded.

As always, many great things are happening around the world through our dedicated staffs at 35 Ministry Centers. These are reports from some of the Ministry Center areas:

China: We just produced and distributed another 1000 copies of the new MP3Audio Bible player, Model C28. We are joyfully informed by the leader of Yunnan Christian Council that two minority churches in the LuFeng County of the ChuXiong District were dedicated in March 2011. These are areas where we support the ETS training. Before, the believers had to walk two-three hours on mountainous roads to attend the nearest church, with two new churches, it will be much easier to attend worship.

Thailand: LHM - Thailand conducted the pilot holistic ministry project "Bright Teeth and Happy Feet" in a poor rural area. The ministry center provided 1,417 students in 10 schools with a 3 month supply of toothpaste, 2 toothbrushes, 1 plastic cup, 3 pair of socks, a brochure with information about oral hygiene care and some Gospel pamphlets. Local dentist were recruited to assist LHM with the project by teaching the students proper brushing techniques.

Cameroon: Leaders of the Protestant Hospital in Ngaoundere, located in north central Cameroon express their great appreciation for the donations and showed firsthand the rooms with newly

installed hospital beds from OGT. The hospital, in a predominantly Muslim region, has a sign, in Arabic, at many entrances to the hospital saying, "Issa e'walad Allah" (English, "Jesus is the Son of God").

Kenya: Our LHM Ministry Center has helped congregations develop a mission plan. Also we are working with the Kamba people of Kenya, thought to be some of the toughest survivors in Kenya. They live pastorally in the arid interior of Kenya where they sometimes need to walk for up to 3 days to get water.

Ethiopia: Our ministry center continues its important outreach into rural areas. A LHM event showing a film screening followed by Evangelism Rallies were held over three days that grew from 400 attending on the first day to approximately 2,000 people attending a Sunday worship service.

Malawi: It is thrilling to report the successful launch and distribution of Children's Bibles. This is a direct result of the special appeal that was announced on "The Lutheran Hour" in December of 2010. Funds enabled us to purchase thousands of Bibles for Malawi, one of the most impoverished counties in Africa.

Latin America: We are presently in 11 countries.

Latvia: We are initiating a new emphasis on working closely with congregations to help evangelism grow within their local communities.
